Musial, who teamed with the Cardinals to take over first place last night when they thrashed the Boston Braves, 5 to 2, Pohlak held the bat-happy Braves to six scattered hits and walked only two batters in scoring his second well-pitched victory. Bilko and Musial each bashed home runs to provide the bulk of the offensive support.

After pitching shut out for seven innings, Robin Roberts weakened in the eighth and gave up five rallies, but stuck out one spinning to gain a 6 to 5 victory for the Phillies over the Reds at Philadelphia. He had allowed only two hits until then on the way to his third triumph. The Reds nicked him for five hits in the inning, including Joe Adcock's three run homer.

Joe DiMaggio had to leave the club because of a sore neck, but his apparent, atom-bomb Mickey Mantle blasted a momentous 440-foot homer and the Yankees otherwise were hitting opportunities in scoring an 8 to 3 victory over the White Sox at Chicago.

Mantle's homer, one of the longest at Comiskey Park history, went into the right center field stands. It was his first big league homer. Yogi Berra also hit a Yankee homer to give Vic Raschi the batting support he needed to score his third victory.

Bob Feller, bent on having a great season, scored his third straight victory for the Indians, topping the Red Sox, 7 to 1, at Cleveland and spoiling the homecoming of his ex-wife Lou Boudreau. Feller gave up only six hits including a double by Boudreau.

The Browns blew a 7 to 0 lead at St. Louis and finally lost a 13-inning struggle to the Senators, 9 to 8 when Mickey Vernon hit a home run for the winning margin after Mickey Harris pitched six scoreless relief innings, allowing just one hit. The victory enabled Washington to remain in a first place tie with Cleveland.

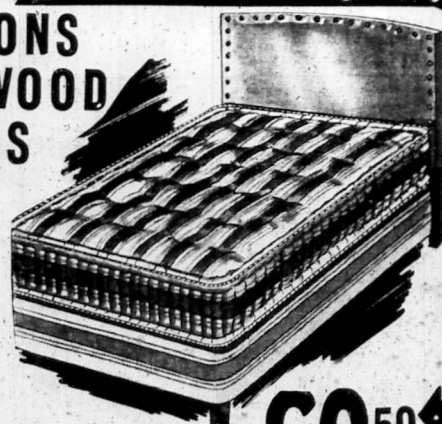

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## Stimulating Child to Create

By GARY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.  
VERY little that a young child sees or hears on television, radio or the movie screen stimulates him to create. What does he hear or see on radio, television or movie screen that stimulates him to create? Drawing, painting or building and constructing with his hands while alone or in cooperation with other children?

As a rule, these passive amusements, requiring just two ears and two eyeballs, tend to divert him from self-amusement and creative fun, alone or with other children. Even the child old enough to read naturally reads less, as a rule, as he looks and listens more.

But almost any parent realizes that good education of the child from the time he can sit up and begin to manipulate objects stimulates him to amuse himself at exploring, experimenting and creating with things he can handle and with lines, color and sounds he can make and, later, to have this amusement at creative fun with other children. Always, in his best education, he continues at self-amusement by creating with his hands and head, with help later on from the printed page.

Since television, radio and the movie screen don't stimulate his creative urges much for self-amusement and active participating amusement with other children, where is he to get such desirable stimulation? From parents and teachers. Always wise parents and teachers have encouraged the child to create by drawing and coloring and painting and making things for fun with his hands, putting things out of his head and dramatizing in all sorts of ways.

We parents should be grateful to the school for its stimulating the child to create. We help the child and teachers. 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school in the direction as we encourage the youngster in his preschool years at self-amusement in creative ways and continue to encourage him in this direction after he enters school—so we stimulate him to color, draw, paint, and to put together blocks and other simple playthings with creative purpose. As we provide him with tools and materials for making things for fun and enjoy his creations. We fire the little child's imagination by reading to him and by listening affection-

ately to the many yarns he spins out of his little head. (My bulletin "How Come the Fairies?" and "Letting Little Children Learn" may be had by sending a self-addressed, stamped envelope to me in care of this paper.) We encourage him at make-believe fun alone or with other children, while we also provide him with good toys, tools and materials. But even more important than materials and playthings to the child's development at creative play are parents and teachers who appreciate what he creates, and express enthusiasm over such.

## New Bill Hikes Liquor Revenue

by DOUGLAS GRAHAM

LANSEING. — The House of Representatives today received the Senate-approved omnibus liquor bill.

The bill passed the Senate Tuesday on a 21 to 6 vote after intermittent debate throughout the day.

State liquor revenues will be increased nearly \$1,000,000 annually if the measure is unchanged by the House and is signed by the Governor.

The main scrap yesterday came over an attempt by Sen. Perry W. Greene, R., Grand Rapids, to attach an amendment forbidding all sale of wines containing more than 16 per cent alcoholic content in Michigan.

The amendment first won Senate approval but later was stricken from the bill on as 11 to 15 vote. Greene blamed sales of cheap "bootleg" wines for creating "bad row" conditions in many communities.

The measure as approved by the Senate boosts license fees for specially designated merchants—beer and wine take-out sellers—from \$25 to \$50 per year. Package liquor dealer licenses are boosted from \$25 to \$50 in towns under 10,000 population and from \$50 to \$75 in cities over 10,000.

In addition, the take-out liquor dealers must pay an added fee of \$1 for every \$1,000 worth of retail liquor sold over \$25,000 per year. The sliding scale feature is new to the state liquor act and is aimed at collecting added fees from large S.D.D. operators, some of whom sell more than \$100,000 or \$400,000 worth of liquor per year. Four members, the Senate bill also boosts their salaries to \$10,000 per

year and abolishes three hearing examiners now assigned to prepare violation cases before appeal hearings to the full commission. Sponsors of the bill said the hearing examiner system instituted two years ago had failed to prove workable.

# Babies, Young Children, Often Victims of This Disorder

**By HERMAN N. BUNDSON, M.D.**

INFANTS and young children are especially subject to attacks of diarrhea. In many cases the upset is due to infection with specific germs, and hence can be treated with one of another of the antibiotic drugs just as when, however, the illness seems to occur in the absence of any infection. The problem of handling it is made more difficult and is largely a matter of soothing the digestive tract until food can again be tolerated.

Recently, a number of children with this type of diarrhea were treated with good results by giving them dried bananas. In carrying out the treatment, the doctor placed the children on feeding of one tablespoon of dried bananas per pound of body weight for each 24-hour period. Two ounces of water were used to dilute each tablespoon of dried banana. Enough feeding was made up for the whole day and the total amount was divided into nine feedings. Boiled water was given as often as possible between feedings.

**In Skimmed Milk**

At the end of two or three days, if the infant's condition was improved, the dried banana was given in skimmed milk. Older infants were also given well-cooked cereals, beef broth, mashed vegetables, and custard.

**Other Method**

With the banana treatment it was found that the average time required for a cure was 2.9 days. By the other method of treatment it was 5.02 days. At the end of 72 hours, out of the 50 children treated with the banana preparation, 17 were rated in good condition and three fair. With the other method of treatment, seven children were good, seven fair, and 36 poor. Bacteria of the 50 children treated with the banana prepared weight during the treatment.

It would seem, therefore, that dried bananas has an effective substance in the treatment of diarrhea in infants and young children.

Bare Report  
Warning of  
Korean War

WASHINGTON (AP)—The long-secret Wedemeyer report on Korea warned President Truman three years before war came that Russia "undoubtedly" would seek control of the country, publication of the document disclosed.

The report, drafted in September, 1947, by Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer, urged that this country undertake a vigorous program of United States arms assistance to the Republic of Korea, give it military advice and supervise a Korean, scout force.

The document, long withheld as top secret by the Administration, was released today by the Senate committee investigating the ouster of Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

Sought Military Aid—Wedemeyer recommended 14 Mr. Truman that American occupation troops remain in South Korea until Russian troops were withdrawn from the north. This was done. But Wedemeyer's recommendations for a strong program of U.S. military aid was not implemented.

Wedemeyer predicted that "undoubtedly" a Russian objective would be to obtain control of South Korea by using the Communist North Korean military forces it sponsored and trained, by infiltration and by other methods usually undertaken by the Reds.

Doubted Invasion Likely—He also stated it was "extremely doubtful" that the Soviets or their North Korean satellites would invade South Korea in "the near future."

Wedemeyer's report was made three years before the North Koreans struck at the South Korean Republic in June, 1950, an invasion followed up by intervention of the Chinese Communists in force in November of 1950.

Wedemeyer said indefinite occupation of South Korea by U.S. military forces would be "unacceptable" to the American public, once the Russian troops withdrew from North Korea. But he said the Soviets would withdraw only after building up a North Korean "People's Army," and that this necessitated long-term American military and economic assistance to the fledgling republic. The U.S. troops were withdrawn in June, 1949, after the Russians also withdrew.
