Wedemeyer Report Followed — Acheson

WASHINGTON.—Secretary of State Dean Acheson said today the United States has carried out all but one of Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer's 1947 recommendations on Korea. Acheson told a news conference that the only recommendation Washington failed to carry out was Wedemeyer's proposal that the United States create a Korean scout force with American officers in command.

Instead, Acheson said, the U. S. built up a 150,000-man Korean defense force with American officers as advisers rather than commanders.

The long-secret Wedemeyer report, made public Tuesday, warned President Truman that Russia then—in 1947—was preparing North Korea Communists for an invasion of the Republic of South Korea. The invasion came last June.

Western Union Asks Rate Boost

NEW YORK.—The Western Union Telegraph Co. asked the Government for permission to increase its interstate message rate to pay a cost-of-living wage increase to its 43,000 employees.

Western Union announced that it filed with the Federal Communications Committee in Washington a new tariff revising its domestic telegraph rates to produce an overall additional gross revenue of about \$14,000.

Iran Takes Over British Oil Interests

TEHERAN.—Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlevi today signed the oil nationalization bill and told Premier Mohammed Mossadegh to begin taking over the British-controlled oil interests immediately. The Shah signed the bill as Britain sent a note to Iran protesting against Iran's "unilateral" decision to nationalize oil in violation of existing agreements with the Anglo-Iranian oil company.

Polio Treatment Reported by 'M' Doctors

CLEVELAND.—The door has been opened for finding a chemical which can be used safely in humans suffering from polio infection, it was reported today.

Drs. Gordon C. Brown and W. W. Ackerman of the University of Michigan, said they have discovered that "a certain chemical compound will stop the growth and multiplication of polio virus in a laboratory culture of human tissue."

The researchers added that "this is the first time that a chemical has been found which will stop the growth of polio virus in human tissue without damaging that tissue."

Seeks Discharge of Ailing Soldier

CHICAGO.—John Amborski, 45, who smuggled his ailing son out of Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, to obtain medical treatment for him, sought today to have the youth discharged from the Army. The son, Stanley, 21, was in improved condition at Great Lakes Naval hospital where he is being treated for virus pneumonia.

Rep. Richard Vail, Republican of Illinois, disclosed that Amborski wrote him April 23—five days before Amborski removed his son without permission from the Army—complaining of the youth's sickness and lack of treatment.

WASHINGTON.—The Senate Agriculture Committee said today that ceiling prices on beef will result in a "meat famine." It called on the Office of Price Stabilization to remove them "without delay."

TOKYO.—The first phase of the Communist spring offensive in Korea has ended in a "great victory" for the United Nations, Lt. Gen. James A. Van Fleet said today. Van Fleet, commander of the 8th Army, spoke as UN task forces probe as much as five miles ahead of the main Allied line seeking contact with the elusive Red armies.

The Communists, bloodied by the loss of 70,000 men in the first phase of their offensive, had pulled back in some sectors to regroup for the second round. They are expected to resume the attack in three or four days.

England Opposes Use of The Bomb

WASHINGTON — The threatened rupture of the Anglo-American alliance, dramatized by Gen. MacArthur's recall and America's own resignation, has much deeper roots than most people realize. The fact is that the British planners and military chiefs are more and more inclined to follow the "no-se" concept of what American strategy rests, and thus in a sense, to challenge also the basis of the Anglo-American alliance.

The heart of the matter is that American strategy is not necessarily based on atomic bombing of population centers, and the British Isles themselves are fatally vulnerable to just this form of attack. This is certainly one reason why the British have already proposed, at least informally, that if war comes, Britain's atomic bombs should not be used against Soviet out-of-city cities, except in retaliation for Soviet attacks on American or allied cities.

Hong on to Thread — The British are urging that, unless the Soviets first use their atomic stockpile for population bombing, the American stockpile should be used only against communication lines, special industrial targets, and military installations rather than in the field. This proposal is based on the assumption that even in war the Russians probably would not use their bombs against allied cities if they knew this would cause a massive retaliation against Russia.

This may be wishful thinking, but in the terribly exposed position in which the British find themselves, special thinking is natural. The British also want to keep the atomic weapon as a powerful argument for their proposal. This is based on a point made by the great American expert on Russia, George Kennan, in a recent issue of "Foreign Affairs."

Would Harden Russians — "We in the outside world," wrote Kennan, "... will never prevail in any struggle against the Soviet power unless the Russian people are our willing allies. That goes for peace as well as for war."

The British, however, would doubtless agree — that the Russian people are not going to be "our willing allies" after thirty million or so Russians have been killed by our atomic bombs. They argue that mass population bombing, except in retaliation, should be as far from the British Hitler as possible, cowering Russia, cowering the people around the regime, and thus ending all hope of quick or decisive victory.

Postal will almost certainly be rejected. For one thing, there's the nature of the bomb itself. In certain climatic circumstances, the atomic bomb can undoubtedly be used effectively as a tactical weapon. Yet the brutal fact is that the atomic bomb is inherently suited, not only to against isolated targets and troops in the field, but for use against the massed populations of cities.

In Hiroshima and Nagasaki, the three primary effects of the bomb — blast, heat flash, and radiation — caused only minor damage. The great bulk of casualties are caused by the city itself: when blast collapses buildings on top of people, and when both blast and heat flash start terrible fires. The true truth is that the atomic bomb is a terrible, unnecessary weapon when it is used in this way to cause great cities to destroy their inhabitants.

Used in any other way, the bomb is no longer a decisive weapon. Heavy industrial machinery is not easily damaged by the blast of modern bombs, even when shot from ground zero, the point at which the bomb is exploded. A soldier in a slit trench would almost certainly live to fight another day after a mine from ground zero, and a soldier would remain intact well under half a mile from ground zero.

Even assuming that many hundreds of bombs were available for tactical use, or against isolated targets — and each bomb represents a very heavy investment — the effects could not be decisive. A weapon with a killing radius of not more than a mile cannot stop a numerically superior army advancing across a fluid front of many hundreds of miles. Thus to accept the atomic bomb as a decisive weapon is of very sharply reducing the value of the American atomic stockpile. And the American atomic stockpile is the central military asset of the West, and the only real existing deterrent to Soviet aggression.

The fact is that the follies of past disarmament have reduced this country and its allies to total reliance on a willingness to use the atomic bomb, in the most ruthless way, if it must be used. Yet it should not surprise us that the British, and our other European allies, are not precisely eager to join us in a crusade which would see their countries either occupied by the Soviets or destroyed. 



Babies, Young Children, Often Victims of This Disorder

By HERMAN H. RONDESEN, M.D.

INFANTS and young children are frequently afflicted by attacks of diarrhea. In many cases the upset is due to infection with specific germs, and hence can be treated with one of another of the antibiotic drugs. In other cases, however, the illness seems to occur in the absence of any infection. The problem of handling it is a most difficult one, and it takes a matter of months the digestive tract until food can again be tolerated.

Recently, a number of children with this type of diarrhea were treated with dried banana. The children were given three to four dried bananas to carry out the treatment, the doctor placed the children on feedings of boiled water and a diet of one percent of body weight for each 24-hour period. Two ounces of water were used to dilute each tablespoon of dried banana.

At the end of two or three days of the infant's condition was improved, the dried banana was continued for 10 days. The children were also given well-cooked cereals, beef broth, mashed vegetables, and custard.
