Jimmy's allowed to play outdoors

CHICAGO — A 4-year-old boy who survived nearly 30 minutes in Lake Michigan's icy waters, has been allowed to play outdoors and will enter a rehabilitation center next

The Chicago Sun-Times said Jimmy Tontlewicz's condition has improved enough for him to be transferred from Children's Memorial Hospital, where he has stayed since his Jan. 15 sledding accident, to the Rehabilitation Institute of

"His physical condidition is very good," Judith Rice, a aildren's Memorial spokeswoman, said. "He runs and plays and is very active.

On Thursday, Jimmy ventured outside the hospital for the

first time since his accident and played hide and seek in a hospital courtyard with his grandmother. Next week, Jimmy is expected to leave the hospital for good to undergo tests and begin a special rehabilitation program at the Rehabilitation Institute.

Dr. Robert Tanz, Jimmy's physician at Children's Memorial, said X-rays show the boy has a diffused brain injury.

But Tanz said damaged cells do not always impair functioning because the brain does not need all its cells.

Hazel Park Police are searching for a man

Hazel Park Police are searching for a man who allegedly gunned down a woman on a city street Thursday night.

She and the suspect may have been married "although they have different last names," said Det. Lt. James McGough, Hazel Park Police. He added that a marital argument possibly prompted the shooting. The woman died from a shotgaun wound to the head. Police are withholding fier name until she is positively identified. She and the suspect are believed to be both 21-years-old and Hazel Park residents, said McGough. The shooting occurred at 10:40 p.m., when

The shooting occurred at 10:40 p.m., when the woman ran from a car that had been traveling on southbound Chrysler Drive, near Elza. The car is registered in the

woman's name. She evidently was driving said McGough.

Witnesses said the woman was shot after

the car stopped suddenly in a traffic lane and was left there with the engine running.

Said one witness, "I heard the car screech to a stop, then I saw the lady jump out, waving her hands. Then the guy jumped out and shot her.

"She fell down right in the middle of the

street. He ran away, down Elza, carrying what looked like a shotgun."

Officers and a tracking dog combed the area. They found an empty shell but not the

Lanni blasts 'deal of the century'

An Oakland County commissioner from Royal Oak is

angry that the Board gave away a \$92,500 piece of property in Springfield Township for \$1.

"They gave away the nicest parcel of land that we've got," said Commissioner James E. Lanni (R-Royal Oak).

Lanni was joined by just two other commissioners, Lawrence R. Pernick (D-Southfield) and Dennis Aaron

(D-Oak Park) in voting against the move. COMMISSIONERS voted to give the land to Springfield

The land, some 7.2 acres of park land fronting the Davisburg Mill Pond, is being used as a park.

It's located near the Youth Activities Center at
Springfield Oaks County Park.

"If we were smart, the Recreation Commission would have developed that land so it would earn money and help offset the \$75,000 deficit incurred by the Youth Activities Center over the past 10 years." Lanni said.

"These guys (Springfield Township officials) just got the best deal of the century," Lanni said.

- Consumer prices, led by a spurt in food costs and a record jump in telephone bills, rose 0.6 percent in January, the biggest monthly increase in inflation since last April, the government said today.

The January increase would be an inflation rate of 7.8 percent on an annual

basis, compared with 3.8 percent for all of 1983.

The Labor Department's Consumer Price Index has risen an average of 0.2 percent each month since prices began a dramatic slowdown late in 1981. The index went up a revised 0.4 percent in December, leaving January's 0.6 percent increase the most since April 1983 when a nickel-a-gallon gasoline tax led to a climb of

CHICAGO (UPI) — One of the leaders of the American Medical Association predicts the vast majority of the nation's doctors will honor an AMA to freeze fees for one year.

AMA trustees Thursday unanimously authorized sending a letter to about 400,000 practicing physicians — both AMA members and non-members urging them to keep their less at current levels.

Dr. John J. Coury, AMA board of trustees chairman, told a news con-ference he estimates "85 to 90 percent of the physicians in this country will go along with it."



In the report made public Thursday, the department said the eight-month FBI investigation did not show how Carter materials reached the Reagan campaign but produced "no credible evidence" any law was violated.

U.S. urged to use oil reserves

WASHINGTON - The chief of the International Energy Agency is urging the United States to consider using its Strategic Petroleum Reserve as a cushion for Western nations during minor and major oil supply disruptions.

The call by Ulf Lantzke, executive director of the Paris-

based agency, comes amid heightened concern among Western leaders over Iran's threat to close the vital Strait of Hormuz and block shipment of oil to nations around the

world.

Lantzke, head of the 21-nation agency, made the call in a speech prepared for delivery today to U.S. energy executives from the oil, coal, gas, utility and nuclear industries.

"David's life has been important for medicine, but his greatest contribution was his death," said Shearer.

"What this has taught us is that there is an important connection between the immune system and the development of cancer or abnormal growth of cells. And while we do not completely understand this problem in David. David has given us this opportunity (for study)," Sharer said.

Clawson completes tree ordinance

The Clawson City Council added rules and regulations to the ordinance which governs the care and removal of trees on the right of way between the curb and the sidewalk in the city. The additional rules now complete the ordinance which

The new guidelines were the brainchild of Councilman Darrel Middlewood, who along with the rest of the council felt that a permanent set of rules were needed to define the city's responsibilities in matters concerning the trees in the

right of way.

"Basically the rules spell out what city hall and the Department of Public Works can and must do under the new ordinance. It's unfortunate that it took so long for us to get them together but now that they are, I'm sure they will be

effective," said Middlewood,
THE MAJOR change is the city has now accepted full
financial responsibility for the removal of dead and diseased

trees and those that cause obstructions.

The city has unofficially accepted most-of-that cost responsibility up until several years ago when the policy changed, apparently without the knowledge of the council. The ordinance which went into effect in November was constructed to clear up any further questions concerning the trees in question in the future, said Middlewood.

Middlewood also explained that a survey of all of the trees in question will be conducted on what will probably turn out to be a yearly to semi-yearly basis.

A CONSISTENT trimming program and limited planting will also be undertaken by the city according to the ordinance. All tree planting by resident along the area between the curb and sidewalk will also be subject to city approval, said Middlewood.

"The new rules in the ordinance don't impose any direct additional costs to the city other than the removal of the trees and that is something that was really an obligation of the city for years anyway." said Middlewood.

Public Service Commissioner Matthew McLogan said he supports the House version because it allows the PSC to design the

allows the PSC to design the lifeline rates do encourage conservation and target them to low-income and sen-ior citizen households.

"There's a general per-ception that lifeline as a conservation measure has worked very well,"

McLogan said.
BUT, HE SAID, the PSC opposes repealing the law because it benefits poor people who do conserve.

Now, his office is turning into a clearing house for promoting Michigan navy beans and for fortifying the seasonings in the

soup.

Levin, D-Mich., opened his office and touted Michigan beans last month when the producers of "The Lawmakers" program on public television decided to have a food critic compare the Senate's soup with that which was recently added to the menu of a swank Washington restaurant. Both recipes use the white navy beans grown in Michigan.

Critic Richard Olney declared the Senate version could use a little more salt, pepper and perhaps a bit of butter. It was not long before correspondence put Levin and his staff to work.

A 69-year-old Bay City, Texas, woman said she was unable to find navy beans in her area and asked Levin for help. He arranged with the Michigan Bean Commission for the woman to receive five pounds of Michigan beans for free. With tongue in cheek, Levin told her that he hoped the Texas market could be

DEAR HELOISE:

We have just bought a house that has natural wood floors. We have always lived in carpeted apartments and don't know what to do to get these floors into tiptop condition and how to keep them beautiful. Please help us! We think natural wood floors are

great! - J.S.

While you didn't say specifically what the problems are, I can give you a few general rules for care and maintenance of wood floors. (This is for a floor with

a relatively unmarred finish.) If the floor is badly worn, you will need to have it refinished to restore its beauty, but if it is merely dull-looking, do this: Buy a waterless cleaner made for wood floors and use it according to directions on the container. Afterwards, wax with a good paste wax

Your wood floors will remain new-looking for

years if you'do three things: Avoid using water to clean them, keep them waxed with paste wax, and remove surface dust regularly. Waxing provides a protective coating that helps to

prevent spills from seeping into the wood. Wipe up any liquids immediately, then wipe the spot dry.

Between waxings, vacuum or dust mop your floors daily or on a regular basis. This will keep surface dust and dirt from being ground or "walked" into the



Heartburn is a confusing symptom. Many people think of it as a disease. It is not. Like all symptoms, it represents the cry of the body for help. When this it represents the cry of the body for help. Consumers Power Company (Consumers). Michigan Consolidated Gas Company (Mich Con), Michigan Gas Utilities Company (MCU) and Southeastern Michigan Gas Company (Southeastern) filed separate applications for approval of new rates designed to make natural gas competitive with alternative fuels, especially No. 6 fuel oil, in response to actual and threaten ed loss of industrial customers to alternative fuels. The Commission approved an Alternate Discount Rate for Mich Con in Case No. U-7109 on November 22, 1983; for Consumers in Case No. ,U-7667 on December 20, 1983, Southeastern in Case Nos. U-7652 and U-7653 on January 11, 1984; and for MGU in Case No. U-7633 on January 24, 1984. The commodity charge was set-at \$4.25 per Dth for Mich Con and \$4.35 per Mcf for the other three companies

On January 31, 1984, the Commission Staff (Staff) filed a motion in each case, requesting that the Commission reopen the case for the limited purpose of evaluating whether the commodity charge is appropriate in light of recent changes in the price of No. 6 feel oil. At tached to each motion was the affidavit of Staff person Gary Kitts stating that the natural equivalent price of No. 6 fuel oil is now \$4.75 per Mcf, plus the cost of transporting oil to the user's facilities.

Each order approving the rate explicitly recognized "that it might be necessary to reevaluate the commodity charge in the event of a change in the price of alternate fuels. The Commission recognized that the commodity charge must be low enough to make natural gas competitive with the price of competitive fuels. but not so low that industrial customers obtain natural gas at a price significantly below the equivalent price of alternative fuels. An addifor a credit in the gas cost recovery reconciliation to non-qualifying customers and the amount of the credit is directly related to the commodity

The Commission trids that the Staff has made a prima facie showing at a significant change in circumstances sufficient to warrant's reexamination of the commodity charge in the rate. The motions should, therefore, be granted. For purposes of the reopening, all five

will be consolidated, unless the Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) determines for good cause that a different procedure should be followed. At the prehearing conference, the ALJ and the parties are to establish a procedure and schedule for dealing expeditiously with the reopened cases. Parties previously granted status as intervenors may continue without filir q new petitions to intervene

The Commission recognizes that by grant ing the Staff's motions one week after they were filed; other parties may effectively be foreclosed from objecting to the reopenings. The Commis

sion believes that the public interest would not be served by waiting for responses. The Staff's allegation of changed circumstances supports a reopening. When other parties have been heard on the merits, it may appear that different (or no) change in the commodity charge is appropriate, but that possibility will not prevent the Commission from reopening the cases





Most of the film centers around a chase involving Allen. Farrow, and two thugs who are out to kill both of them. This basically ridiculous story becomes a

LIQUID SKY - (Grade: B-) Two New Wave women become involved with neroin-seeking aliens who destroy people as they are having orgasms. 1. Pass. The best way of deciding what to do is to apply, in reverse, the general rule that an opening bid facing an opening bid means game. There is no question that you have the values for an opening bid, but you certainly have nothing to spare. It is therefore highly unlikely there's a game, since partner is known to lack the values for an opening bid and you barely made the grade for one.

Partner's two diamond response (not forcing because he passed originally) promises 10 or more points and a fairly good suit. Consequently, with only a part score in the offing, and no good reason to think that a better contract than two diamonds is available. you should pass while there's still a good chance for

a plus score.

2. Four spades. This isn't much of a hand, it's true, but its actual value depends much more on what you out its actual value depends much more on what you hear than on what you see. Your partner is virtually guaranteeing nine tricks with spades as trumps, and asking you to carry on to game if you have a little something. So, although North's three spade bid is not forcing, you should happily bid four on the basis of your J-8-4-3 of spades and ace of clubs. Partner may have either of these hands:

3. Three hearts. Despite partner's previous pass, there is a reasonably good chance for game and you should pursue it by raising hearts. True, you have only two trumps, but that should not deter you, since North is sure to have either six hearts or five good ones. Partner may have one of these hands:



Rockwell's neighbors to vote on museum

STOCKBRIDGE, Mass. (UPI) -Norman Rockwell's former neighbors may get a chance to vote on whether a museum of the late artist's works should be allowed to move to larger quarters, enabling it to stay in their Berkshires town.

"I think the people should be heard," Selectwoman Mary Flynn said. "Many people in town would like to have a referendum.

The three-member Board of Selectmen postponed a vote that was expected to scuttle the museum's expansion plans and force it to move out of the picturesque town that Rockwell often captured in his work.

The board will meet again Monday to give residents a chance to collect signatures calling for a a non-binding referendum, Miss Flynn said.

In the latest proposal, museum officials wanted to spend \$2.4 million. to renovate the boyhood home of astronaut F. Storey Musgrave, lo-cated on the edge of town, to house the collection. Selectmen previously rejected proposals to expand the current building or move to another site near the center of town.

Beacco indicated he might change his mind if a referendum indicates a majority of the town's 5,900 residents support the move. Several public hearings have shown the townspeople

to be split on the issue.

THE SELECTMEN are facing a deadline of March 19, when a 90-day decision period set by the museum runs out. But officials said they may ask the museum's board of directors to grant them a 30-day extension to allow time for the referendum.



Chrysler Corp. Thursday capped its comeback from near-bankruptcy four years ago with a record 1983 profit of \$700.9 million, meaning a combined \$6.1 billion record profit for the Big Four auto-

General Motors Corp. reported record earnings for the year of \$3.7 billion, Ford Motor Co. made \$1.86 billion and American Motors Corp. had a \$146.7

The previous record for the Big Four automakers was set in 1977, when the firms made \$5.2 billion. That year, GM made \$3.3 billion, Ford \$1.7 billion, Chrysler \$200 million and AMC \$8 million.

CHRYSLER'S previous record profit for a single year was \$422 million in 1976. The 1983 earnings translated to \$5.79 per share, compared to a 1982 profit of \$170.Lmillion or \$1.84 per share.

Homemade house Royal Oak solar home built from salvage

By EILEEN MATTSON

Ted Strunk affectionately refers to his Royal Oak residence as the "homemade house." This

draws a chuckle from his wife, Jane, who says, "You make it sound like bread." Memories of the aroma of Gram's home-made bread baking are as warm and cozy as the Strunk's feel in their home.

THE HOME is unique in many ways. Ted and Jane built the 2,2000 square foot home from the basement up to its 57 degree angled roof for \$30,000 including the price of the lot. Also salvage materials were utilized and the California beach style home is heated by solar energy. The solar system was one of the first of 20 in Michigan in

"We were looking for a way around utility bills." Ted said. "Plus we wanted low-cost, low-

maintenance living."
The Strunk's chose the hybrid system of solar heat, one of several available but typical for the North Central region, according to Strunk. It incorporates solar panels on the roof which collect heat from the sun and distribute the heat to the inside via vents and a low-wattage fan hung in the ceiling which circulates the warm air through the system. A wood stove which burns for 12 to 14

hours and a furnace in the basement for backup.
complete the system.

"OUR GAS BILLS are \$40 a month including
\$16 for hot water and cooking. That's about \$400 a
year and most homes this size cost \$600 a year to " Strunk said

Jane considers cleanliness an added advantage

Jane considers cleanliness an added advantage of solar heat. "A furnace burns heat and then its blown through dusty ducts," Ted Added.

The window frames are wood rather than aluminum to cut heat loss and windows are covered at night with folding window shades or window quilts to contain the heat."

VERTICLE WOOD panels cover the exterior rather than brick for hetter insular value and the

rather than brick for better insular value and the exterior walls have 2 by 6s with 24 inch on center studs to accomodate more insulation

Inside the house is open and airy divided into two zones with the upper level made into a large loft which extends to a deck for summer use Between zones is the laundry room with a dryer vented to add additional heat and moisture.

The front zone, a living and dining room and kitchen is for day use while the rear zone for night living contains bedrooms and a bath.

TO ADD TO THE expanse of the home is a view overlooking the golf course.

The entire project was a labor of love for the Strunks. They went to the drawing board eight years ago.
"We looked and looked for an older house with we looked and looked for an older house with charm and character but couldn't find what we wanted in our price range." Jane said. Ted designed and redesigned while Jane did the problem solving and together they had to research

information for solar heat. "WE THOUGHT OUT everything as best we

could," Jane added. Ready to break ground, friends and family gathered round and helped raise walls, shingle and roof and worked at all aspects of building a house until it was complete. Jane's father. Nat Rosenberg, a commercial contractor, lined up subcontracters to do the cement work and form the proper ditches.

"We wanted to use as many contracters from Royal Oak as we could," Ted added.

During the planning stages, the Strunk's discovered materials they could salvage. Ted and a crew of friends were given permission to tear down boards from an old barn that became a wall, beams and railings. They tore up a hardwood floor from a house at Ten-Mile and Main set for detections. destruction to make way for the I-696 expressway They were also given a parquet floor for the dining and kitchen area.
"It's amazing what you can find," Ted said.

THE ABANDONED prizes are blended into a decor with browns and soft yellows and the lifestyle of the Strunks who believe in preserving

"We recycle everything we can," they said.

Once moved in, the Strunks discovered some pleasant surprises.

There seem to be more than one list, and I find that some of my stocks either move from one to the other, or disappear altogether. What is going on?

A: The National Association of Securities Dealers which collects and distributes OTC stock price in-formation through its computerized NASDAQ system provides three different listings of OTC prices. The major-list is NASDAQ National Market Issues

To be on this list, an OTC stock must have had at least 690,000 shares traded a month for the prior six months and sell at \$10 or more, or have had at least

100.000 shares traded a month for the prior six months and sell for \$5 or more.

The second list is called the NASDAQ National List, with 1.900 issues. To get on this list, an OTC company must have had a net income of \$300,000 in the last

So your daughter has gone and married that nice ing man. Have you gained a con-in-law, only to lose a notion? Not necessarily

If, for instance, they are both in school and you send money to support them, you may have gained ANOTHER exemption. The usual test for dependency holds, do you provide more than half of their support?

What if you support your child through most of the year, until a Thanksgiving wedding? If you've supplied more than half of his or her support during the year, and this can include college tuition, the value of housing all home, a car, the wedding gown, and the reception—you can 'still claim an exemption if your child earned more than \$1,000 during the year, the exemption is permitted only if he or she was still 19 at the end of the year or was a full-time student for at legst five months, during the year.

There is one important proviso, however. The married child who is being claimed as a dependent may not file a

rhere is one important process, asswers. The marrier child who is being claimed as a dependent may not file a joint tax return with his or her spouse unless neither of them is actually HEQUIRED to file, and their return is sent in merely to claim a refund. You and your married children must decide together who has most to gain: you with the extra exemption, or they with the advantages of a solid register.

And if your married child is out of school, over 19, and totally self-supporting? You may have lost an exemption, but you've also dropped a hefty responsibility. You're probably better off, in dollars and cents.
