Henry Leonard Williams, 47, was sentenced Friday by U.S. District Judge Avern Cohn. Williams pleaded guilty to possession of a sawed-off shotgun in an agreement in which 12 charges against him were dropped.

Williams was accused of making threats against Oakland County Executive Daniel Murphy and others in letters signed with the name "Shiva," the Hindu god of destruction and reproduction. During the investigation, a sawed-off shotgun was found in Williams' apartment.



Paynes provide another look at art glass

Model houses decorated with art glass sell first

When a person wanted to build an elegant home around the turn of the century, it was only natural that he or his architect confer with an art glass studio, such as Louis Tiffany's, to design and craft the stained glass windows and beveled glass doors that were an integral part of fine residences of

That relationship, and even the concept of an art glass studio, seems to have been dormant for decades. But it's an idea that Vicky and Chris Payne have been

resurrecting.
Owners of Cutters, which recently moved from a Woodward location to a former carpentry shop at 110 Maxwell, Royal Oak, the pair have been encouraging designers and architects to take another look at art


And many of them have. "A national survey has shown that model houses that have been decorated with art glass were the first ones sold," Vicky Payne

OK, that's fine, but just what is art glass? Art glass is those stained glass windows and leaded glass doors that many homeowners threw out in the 50s and 60s

because they were "old-fashioned." Well, those delicate tulip panes and the elegant beveled side lights are offering a personalized touch for the homeowner of the 80s who doesn't want a cookie-cutter house.

"Ninety percent of the work now is in bevel or textured clear glass," said Payne. Bevel glass, which is recognizable by its angled edge, is expensive because of the four-step shaping and polishing process that must be done by hand. Payne said a machine hasn't yet been developed to do the delicate work.

While architects and designers have started to come around to using art glass in

their designs, it wasn't easy.
"Some builders were afraid to use it,"
Payne explained. "It's very pers onal. Now, it's becoming very popular here."
While being beautiful to look at, art glass

also covers a multitude of sins, from a bad view to distracting headlights from the street to keeping snoopy neighbors from peering through the windows.

A customer can design the exact door he or she wishes for a house. The Paynes have the wood door frames ("People are getting away from steel doors," Vicky Payne said) and can select glass panels as simple or as

ornate as they wish.

Looking for a quality oak door, the Paynes finally found a Canadian mill to supply the doors. But being very "pro-Michigan," they continued their search until they discovered a supplier in the state.

"We wanted to make art glass 'purchasable," said Vicky Payne. "We just want to do the work for you."

As an example, Payne showed a three-

paneled screen with a stained glass panda languishing in a bamboo patch. She explained that the cost of the screen could be lowered by choosing a less complicated design or increased by selecting a more intricate subject.

Vicky, who organized banking seminars, "left the three-piece suits for the flannels and blue jeans," when Cutters began. The six-member firm now does renovation and restoration work, has commercial accounts, has done commission work for McDonald's, is in the midst of installing an Israeli artist's large fused glass window in a West Bloomfield synagogue, has given tours and lectures, invented tools for the craft, produced a video entitled "The Fine Art of Soldering," while offering classes and

operating a gift and poster gallery.
"The studio just got bigger and bigger,"
Vicky Payne said. "There's not a whole lot of places where customers can see what they're getting. The other store just didn't have room to show everything.

Old stained glass can be expensive restoration job

Sure, that piece of old stained glass looks great. There's only a few small pieces missing. It can't be too difficult or expensive

Old glass may be beautiful, but if it's not in excellent shape, it can cause headaches

and cost quite a bit to repair.

"People have to be careful about buying old glass," said Vicky Payne of Cutters, an art glass studio in Royal Oak. "A panel always needs some kind of attention."


For example, Payne says all old glass, unless it was never exposed to the outside, needs some sort of recementing to make it airtight and waterproof. The process also keeps the glass from moving around.

The cost comes in replacing the glass. Much of the old glass just isn't available anymore to use in restoration work, Payne said. Each sheet of glass, much like dye lots in yarn, is different, she explained.

"A broken bevel costs \$2 an inch to repair. So a small tulip with 30 inches of beveling can come to \$60 just for that," Payne said. "A restoration charge can easily reach


Cutters' version of the Royal Oak - a stained glass tree surrounded by four beveled panels

For District 17 commissioner, McPherson challenges Olsen

Today The Daily Tribune begins the first of a series of pre-election profiles and questions and answers of candidates for county commissioner.

The first profiles focus on district 17 where incumbent John E. Olsen is facing a challenge from Angus McPherson.

Election day is Nov. 4.

ANGUS McPHERSON, Democrat, 68, married, two children, graduate of Berkley High School, attended Detroit College of Applied Science. World War II veteran. Serves on the Berkley City Council and the Oakland Intermediate School District. Formerly served on the Berkley School Board.

Q: Do communities in the northern end of the county receive more county services for their tax dollars than do residents in the southern end of the county?

A: Yes. A large portion of the county's population is in the southern end. There are about 13 cities located in the south end. Any land acquition always goes to the north. I understand that because were land poor here, but there it's just not fair. should be greater equity as far as

comes from the south end and goes for good roads in the north. There isn't a fair distribution of funds for roads. The Republicans carry the clout on the county board and they haven't been doing right by the south end.

Q: Oakland County operates and funds the 52nd District Court but has refused requests from other communities to operate any more district courts. Do you think the county should assume control of other district courts?

A: Yes. Absoltuely. Why should we pay for a district court in Troy, one of the richest cities around when the





county won't pay for courts in Berkley and Oak Park. If they don't take over the courts in Berkley and Oak Park, they should give us enough money to hlep our own courts. The ultimate solution would be fore the state to take over all the courts. In the meantime,

ould Oakland County open a satellite county clerk's in the southern end of the county?

A: Yes. Obviously all the things can't come down here, but a significant amount can. Why should someone have to drive all the way to Pontiac to get a marriage license or to record a deed? I think putting a satellite clerk's office in the southern end of the county would equalize some of the amount of money that now goes to the north.

JOHN E. OLSEN, Republican, 54, married, two children, undergraduate degree in finance from Pennsylvania State University, graduate degree in business and public administration from Central Michigan University.

Employed by General Motors Corporation as a financial administrator. A former mayor of Huntington Woods, Olsen is seeking his fourth term as a county commissioner.

Q: Do communities in the northern end of the county page ceive more county services for their tax dollars than do residents

in the southern end of the county? A: No. It's very difficult to determine where the inequities are. The northern areas receive road patrol services from the county sheriff's department. They pay for it, but I want it 100 percent reimbursed. It's a nice service for those who don't have a police force. I would encourage them to get their own police force. Parks and recreation is another area of concern. The parks are located in the north because that's become incorporated, people begin to about it.



Q: Oakland County operates and funds the 52nd District Court but has refused requests from other communities to operate any more district courts. Do you think the county should assume control of other district courts?

A: Yes. The county should take over more district courts because there is more evidence that courts are revenue losers. Those who say the county shouldn't take over any more courts are those who already have been taken care of. If the county refused to take over more courts, it has an obligation to pay for the court deficits of district courts not in the county system in the same way people in those areas pay for the deficit of the county-run 52nd District Court. The only other solution would be for the county to get out of the district court business altogether.

Q: Should Oakland County open a satellite county clerk's in the southern end of the county?

A: Yes. A large portion of the county population is down here. We've had numerous requests from several communities for a satellite county clerk's office. The county clerk claims \$80,000 is too much to spend, but the county is willing to spend \$1.3 million for courts. That's inequitable. If enough people ask for it, then we ought to provide it. At what point will the county recognize that's what the people want? I think enough eople have asked for it already. 



In both young and old animals, the parasites weaken the animal's immune system and reduce its ability to

The presence of adult roundworms in the intestine can be determined by symptoms: a pot-belly, diarrhea, vomiting, lack of energy, thinness, slow growth rate and dull coat. Migrating roundworms may cause the animal

Roundworm diagnosis may be made by observing spaghetti-like roundworms in the vomitus or stool. Often, diagnosis is possible only after microscopic examination of a stool sample. To prevent roundworm infestations, keep pets away

from areas where other animals frequently deposit their stools. If possible, discourage the hunting and eating of small animals. The public health significance of roundworms should

not be overlooked. Literally thousands of eggs may be deposited in a single stool sample. The eggs can remain in the environ-

ment for years. Children playing on a lawn or digging in soil or a sandbox may encounter the worm eggs and become

Consequently, it's important to remove animal droppings on a daily basis and bury them deep in the ground.

They should not be buried in gardens. Sandboxes should be covered when not in use because

cats often use them as litterboxes. Finally, have the pet's stool checked frequently by a veterinarian. It is a small price to pay for the good health of a good friend.





Tears can't drown pain from AIDS

CRESSON, Pa. (AP) — There has been no reprieve from pain for Patrick and Lauren Burk since they lost their 11/2-year-old son to AIDS:

Anger, guilt and fear haunt Burk, a hemophiliac who apparently contracted the deadly disease from blood products, and his wife, who has AIDS-related symptoms. And the tears have yet to subside.

There are days I just don't want to get out of bed. Pat has those days, too," Mrs. Burk, 25, said.

Her husband, a quiet, frighteningly frail man of 28, was stricken with the AIDS virus, apparently from his regular doses of blood clotting concentrates. He unwittingly passed it on to his wife, who became

pregnant with their son, Dwight.

The baby contracted the disease before birth, becoming the world's first reported case of AIDS in the child of a hemophiliac.

Dwight died Dec. 13, 1985, at 20 months of age. The couple's sole relief has been Nicole, a healthy

5-year-old from Mrs. Burk's first marriage.

"She's really helped us," Mrs. Burk said. "When we cry, she says, 'Mommy, why do you cry now for him when he doesn't have any tubes and he's not hurting

"She'll also be outside at night and she'll say the brightest star is Dwight up in the sky. She'll say, 'Hi,' to it and wave."

AIDS. Her symptoms include swollen lymph nodes, weight loss, exhaustion and a persistent cough.

To help make ends meet and to provide for Nicole, the Burks are suing a Pittsburgh hospital, a blood bank, three doctors and six pharmaceutical firms

The family tries to live normally, but it doesn't keep Mrs. Burk from remembering her son's crying and her prayers that he stop. "It's all out of being frustrated and not being able to help."

In her dreams, however, Dwight is alive and well.

As the famous Niagra Falls churned in the background and hundreds of spectators gawked, aerialist Philippe Petit walked a high wire above the Niagara River gorge, a stunt he had wanted to perform 10 years ago. Petit, 37, who once walked a tightrope between the 110-story towers of the World Trade Center in New York, walked 50 feet on a cable across part of the gorge Sunday for the benefit of photographers and spectators before performing the stunt again later in the day for a movie. Petit came to Niagara Falls in 1976 to try to get permission to cross the gorge on a tightrope, but was turned down by the New York State Parks Commission. On Sunday, he was able to do part of that stunt, walking back and forth from the rim of the gorge to the boom of a crane 170 feet above the river. Petit was re-creating an 1859 tightrope walk across the gorge for a Canadianproduced film about the river.

A Madison Heights woman who died of carbon monoxide poisoning this week may have fainted or been knocked unconscious while trying to repair her garage door, police said.

Jennie Gable, 50, was found lying face down in her closed garage at 2:48 p.m. Wednesday by her husband, said Lt. Donald Szuminski of the Madison

Heights police department.

Her body was located near her still-running car and beside a ladder, he said. An autopsy revealed she also suffered a head injury.

"Everthing else was normal," Szuminski said. "Her purse was inside the car next to where she had been seated; there were no signs of forced entry. There was no sign of any problem whatsoever."

Police have ruled out the possibility of suicide.

Szuminski is unsure how long the woman was in the

garage before she was discovered.







"I wasn't scared. I did it." Last week Ronald Bailey, 27, was found guilty of kidnapping and firstdegree murder of a 13-year-old boy.

During the trial Bailey described how he took the boy to a cabin. Bailey said he talked to him, and the boy seemed frightened.

Frightened? What else would a normal human

expect? When asked if he killed the boy;

Bailey said yes.

When asked why, he said "because he looked like me. It was a mistake." During the trial Ronald Lloyd Bailey admittred to having sexual relations with 16 men and boys, beginning in the third grade.
Yes, this is a story which goes back

into the past. It involves another dead child as Bailey is facing another murder charge in the kidnap-slaying of a Ferndale boy.

In 1975 Bailey was arrested in an incident involving another 10-yearold boy he abducted and tried to strangle to death.

He was 16 at the time. Bailey was sentenced to five years probation in Wayne County Circuit

How could this man be on the streets, prowling on children? "I wasn't scared. I did it." Why wouldn't he do it? The criminal

system failed Ronald Bailey. Our system helped kill two boys. Our system is going to kill others if we don't learn something from the

justice system and the mental health

horrible story of Ronald Bailey. We could put Ronald Bailey to death if Michigan had the death penalty. It would not be an unjust end to his life.

It might be the right step to take, but the death penalty alone will not stop the murders of children and


others in our society.

Legislators don't know what they're doing here

The United States House of Representatives last week turned in without doubt the most disgraceful performance in its entire career when it passed three of the largest and most controversial bills in its history with virtually most, if not all, of the members knowing nothing about them or in some cases not even having seen them until the time that they came up on the floor. Moreover, both houses are fast getting the

so-called Gramm-Rudman-Hollings budget balancing amendment, and it is becoming crystal clear that the budget is never going to be balanced in our lifetime as it is not politically practical to do so.

First, to the three pieces of legislation referred to above. The House, under virtually a closed rule which drastically restricts debate, passed a \$13 billion bill designed to bring the 1987 budget in line with the restrictions of Gramm-Rudman, but which did so only in words on paper because there were gross misstatements and slight-of-hand and smoke and mirrors.

Members did not know what was in the bill and held their noses while they voted to

The bill was so huge that in the time allotted for consideration of the bill no one could have had an inkling of what was in it except the staff who wrote it.

Which leads me to observe that virtually all of the legislation passed is written by the staff of various committees and that they have far greater influence on the laws we live by than-anyone who is not intimately familiar with the legislative process can

The second bill passed last week was the conference report on the tax bill. Here again the closed rule came into play and members did not get a chance to know what was in this gargantuan piece of legislation encompassing some 2,500 pages - not including

the report accompanying it. The third bill coming before the House was the joint resolution and which had to be passed by both houses and signed by the president before Oct. 1, the start of the new fiscal year, so that the government could remain open for business.

The Congress has been passing these joint resolutions since the end of World War II because the House and Senate committees are unable, for various reasons, to get the necessary appropriation bills through Con-

gress by the beginning of the fiscal year. It is a disgraceful performance made much worse by the fact that about every-thing including the kitchen sink is included in the bill. It was the largest money bill in history, totaling some \$456 billion.

Needless to say, not any of the 435 members had any real idea what was in it. Now the president has said that he will veto it if the Senate does not drastically reduce

There has got to be a better way to legislate than this, but the public knows virtually nothing about what is going on or cares less. Congressman William S. Broomfield, R-Birmingham, should hang his head in shame and resign his job, but he won't because he believes in the theory of "go along and get along" which is the ruling philosophy of the House. Now, as to the gutting of Gramm-Rud-

man, a little is taken out of the budget and then more is put back in so that the officials

charged with carrying out the amendment will look the other way and say that the deficit for 1987 is within the scope of the Act, and we will go merrily on our way to larger deficits because the public really

"living" matter, think about a plant. At what point are the substances brought in by the plant from the soil, air, etc. considered alive before they become a part of its system? Or how about a human; nutrients are ingested and are incorporated into bodily tissue.

At what point are these materials considered "alive" or "dead?" Both organic and inorganic materials are sometimes involved in reactive chemical processes that, when completed, may comprise some of the basic structures found in the cells of living or-

As for the idea that DNA's bases and acids would neutralize each other before being incorporated into the molecule, I suggest that before openly stating a fault in a scientific theory, one should make sure of his/her facts. If it were done, one would find after a bit of research that enzyme reactions, etc. are involved in the construction of such a molecule.

It is not as simple a process as one would draw while contemplating the pH scale and drawing simple conclusions after relying on only one source of information.

The same idea is involved with genetic . codes added with the human brain and everything else as being mathematically impossible to have produced by random chance.

If one were to be truly interested in this idea, finding out more about the field of cognitive science is advisable.

Also, there is the idea that when an evolutionary characteristic develops, benefits other than those one would have intended are later realized.

One last point, "...a power beyond our understanding created the universe and every living thing in it," is not the same as saying that "nature caused things to evolve by chance" as stated in the letter although it is considered a plausible explanation for the introduction and reshaping of the forms of life on this planet by many.

In last week's 24-21 loss to the Cleveland Browns, Detroit's special teams came in for heavy criticism from the coaching staff.







"No," he said, "Rip has waited 30 years for me to shut up.'


Ripken was passed over for the job twice previously when Weaver retired at the end of the 1982 season and again when successor Joe Altobelli was fired June 14, 1985.





"We object to the reductions, but we're convinced that we'll probably have to do at least 2 percent in fiscal 1987," said Chapman B. Cox, the assistant secretary for personnel. "The House and Senate have adopted different approaches in their authorization bills, but both have dictated reductions in the officer force.'

Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Ind., chairman of the foreign Relations Committee, appearing on the NBC program "Meet the Press," called Gadhafi a "menace" and said Americans should know if the Libyan leader encourages terrorism. He added, "I would just say this particular campaign ... was unfortunate.

Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., the ranking Democrat on the Armed Services Committee, who also appeared on the NBC program, said, "Now when you say that Gadhafi is up to something, the American press and therefore, perhaps the American people will say, 'I don't believe you anymore.'

MIAMI (AP) — Metal window bars intended to keep burglars out kept a mother and five children inside a blazing apartment, where they died on the first day of National Fire Prevention Week.

Peggy Williams, 36, her four children, ages 10 to 14, and a friend's 10month-old son died of smoke inhalation Sunday, said city Fire Department spokeswoman Christie Hickman.

"If it wasn't for the security bars, they probably could have gotten out," Hickman said. "Flames were shooting out of the windows and the heat was so intense, the security bars were actually glowing. The fire itself was right at the front door, making immediate entry impossible."

Mrs. Williams' husband, Frank, 39, and one of their daughters escaped the fire that officials said began in a pot on the kitchen stove.

Mrs. Williams and four of the children were found dead in a barred-in bathroom of the apartment. Two of the youngsters were in a partly filled bathtub. The windows were open. The fifth child was found in the bedroom. "I hate to use the word ironic, but today is the first day of National Fire Prevention Week when we really put our push on to try and make people aware to prevent such tragedies," Ms. Hickman said.

Two residents of two other units in the four-unit apartment building also escaped. The fourth apartment was unoccupied.

Rehnquist takes over

WASHINGTON (AP) — A newly constituted Supreme Court, beginning its 1986-87 term today, is set to explore issues such as alleged racial bias in death penalty laws, the teaching of creationism in public schools and the employment rights of pregnant women.

President Reagan, hoping to reshape the court, promoted William H. Rehnquist to chief justice after 14 years as the court's leading conservative, and appointed Antonin Scalia, another staunch conservative. Warren E. Burger has retired after 17 years as chief justice, the longest tenure in the job this century, but his departure and Scalia's arrival are

not expected to tip the court's ideological balance on most issues. Since Burger was a reliable Rehnquist ally, Scalia's appointment does not add to the conservative bloc's numerical clout.

The court's power still resides in the middle, with the "swing votes" of Justices Lewis F. Powell, Sandra Day O'Connor, Byron R. White, Harry A. Blackmun and John Paul Stevens.

Four of the justices - William J. Brennan Jr., Powell, Thurgood Marshall and Blackmun — are 77 or older but none has voiced any desire to retire from his lifetime post. If Reagan gets the chance to replace any one of the four, the court's ideological balance could change dramatically

The court already has selected 91 of the some 150 cases in which it will issue — after full briefing and oral arguments — precedent-setting decisions during its nine-month term. Between today and the end of autumn, cases will be chosen to complete that docket.

CHARLESTON, S.C. (AP) — The two beers Nelson McIntosh packed for a 90-minute boat ride from one island in the Bahamas to another didn't last long when a storm disabled his boat and left him adrift in the Atlantic for seven weeks.

When fishermen found McIntosh malnourished, dehydrated and suffering from hypothermia, the first thing he asked for was another beer.

"I am a beer drinker," the 27-year-old lobsterman said with a weak smile from his bed in Charleston Memorial Hospital on Sunday. He weighed only about 80 pounds, down from 180 pounds, when he was found by fishermen on aturday, but he was alert and in fair condition. The nursing supervisor said he probably will be

confined to bed for two or three days. McIntosh was wearing only shorts and packed no food for what he expected to be a short trip from his home on Shrub Key to Walker's Key. He

was delivering a 22-foot twin-engine outboard Guard Chief R.W. Brisson said. A thunderstorm broke the boat's steering gear and his second engine was out of gas. He drifted

into the Gulf Stream. "The only provision he had on board was two beers," Brisson said. Also discovered on board were five live fish, cups used to collect rainwater

"I imagine he was chewing sushi," Brisson said. Looking weak and holding a white bed cover tightly around his body and bearded face, McIntosh declined to have his picture taken Sunday. "I don't look like I should," he said.

CHICAGO (AP) — Tall children tend to be do better on IQ tests than short children, say researchers who are at a loss to explain the phenomenon.

But-the Stanford University researchers, writing in the October issue of the medical journal Pediatrics, said they didn't think growth hormones would make kids smarter.

"Until careful clinical studies examining this issue have been completed, any effect of such growth-promoting therapies upon intellectual development or academic achievement must be considered unlikely," the article said.

As a result scores of workers swallowed radium and they consequently had higher than normal rates of certain kinds of

It is obvious that excesses of radiation exposure on the job have in the past caused serious problems, but today we are in much better shape. Because we understand the theory of radiation and how to protect against it today's work environment can be monitored for radiation levels and the physical plant and worker's personal gear can be modified to protect against increased risk. - S.D.

Q. My daughter had a Caesarean delivery four months ago. I now that she plans to have other children. Will she always need a Caesarean operation?

A. It was once considered a medical adage that "Once a Caesarean, always a Caesarean." This was based on the fact that the pelvic bones of the mother do not change during later pregnancies.

In most instances, the delivery of a child by Caesarean section was necessary because the baby's body was too large to pass through the normal vaginal birth canal. A bony malformation of the mother's pelvis may also have been responsible.

In some instances, even if there is no disproportion between the size of the child and the mother's pelvis, a Caesarean section may be necessary if the child is in respiratory distress and must be delivered quickly.





The '87s: Showdown at showro

Domestic automakers take off in all sorts of directions in 1987, importing highpriced two-seat luxury cars from Europe, beefing up their compact lineups and putting greater emphasis on light trucks.

A new foreign competitor enters the U.S. market in 1987. Austin Rover Group Ltd. of Britain will offer the Sterling, a fourdoor luxury car built with the help of Honda Motor Co. Ltd. of Japan; which introduced a similar luxury car of its own, the Acura Legend, last spring.

And as the 1986 model year brought the first cars from South Korea and Yugoslavia, 1987 will bring an economy car from another low-wage country, Brazil.

An array of new products will hit show-rooms this week during what industry analysts expect will be a period of lessening demand. Sales incentives could return, and customers willing to shop around may find dealing easier than in years past.

Here's what the automakers have in

AMERICAN MOTORS — For 1987. AMC will try to get serious again about imports from its French partner, Renault. Sales of imported Renault cars in the United States have slowed to less than 100 a week. Meanwhile, sales of the U.S.-made Renault Alliance and Encore subcompacts are down more than 40 percent from a year

AMC will begin the long battle back with the introduction of two Renault imports: the compact Medallion and the Alpine, a sports car that will compete in image — and in price — with the Chevrolet Cor-

AMC will try to improve sales of the Renault Alliance by offering a sporty version called the GTA. The two-door sedans and convertibles will come with a highoutput 2.0-liter engine and five-speed transmission.

While its car sales founder, AMC has been selling Jeep utility vehicles at record rates.

The Jeep Cherokee and Wagoneer will have available as options a new 4.0-liter straight-6 engine developed by AMC. It will replace a Chevrolet V-6 that AMC was unhappy with.

Also offered for 1987 will be a second version of the Jeep Comanche pickup, with a shorter wheelbase and shorter cargo box.

CHRYSLER CORP. — Chrysler gets a new flagship car this fall, built in Italy by Maserati using a turbocharged 2.2-liter Chrysler engine and many Chrysler components.

The Chrysler-Maserati, code-named the Q-car, is a two-seat luxury coupe intended to boost Chrysler's image among upscale buyers of European imports. The esti-mated price is about \$25,000, with a limited production of 6,000 annually.

The No. 3 U.S. carmaker began the 1987 model year early with the May introduction of the America series of the Dodge Omni-Plymouth Horizon. By limiting the colors and variations in options, Chrysler was able to cut the prices on the pacts and gain brisk sales.

A new series of upscale Chrysler subcompacts debuts in 1987 as the Dodge hatchbacks are based on, and built on the same assembly line as, the Chrysler LeBa-

ron GTS and Dodge Lancer sports sedans. Later in the model year, Chrysler will introduce its new J-car line under the Chrysler LeBaron name. The midsize coupes and convertibles are meant to com-

pete against the Ford Thunderbird. The Chrysler Laser sporty car will be dropped. Only Dodge division dealers will get the company's G-series car, which is sold as the Dodge Daytona. The Daytona will be sold in three versions with restyled

exteriors, including hidden headlamps. Extended versions of the Dodge Caravan-Plymouth Voyager minivans will be offered. They are more than 14 inches longer than the base models. A 3.0-liter -6 engine will be optional on all models.

Chrysler is discontinuing its limousine. In trucks, Chrysler's new line of compact pickups, the Dodge Dakota, debuted in the

Chrysler also will enter for the first time the market for small, Jeep-style four-wheel drive vehicles. Called the Dodge Raider, it will be imported from the Japanese fac-tories of Chrysler's partner Mitsubishi Motors Corp. It will be nearly identical to the Mitsubishi Montero, which already is sold in America through Mitsubishi's dealer network.

FORD — The Ford Mustang, Ford Thunderbird and Mercury Cougar get facelifts for 1987.

The Mustang gets a new hood, grille, headlamps and front facias and a new interior. The Thunderbird and Cougar get new sheet metal all around - the first total facelift since 1983, when the cars ushered in Ford's bubble-shaped look.

A 3.0-liter fuel-injected V-6 engine replaces the 2.8-liter V-6 on the Ford Aerostar minivan. The F-Series and Bronco trucks get front-end facelifts, including flush headlights.

Ford says goodbye to carburetors across its car lines in 1987, except for some police cars, switching totally to fuel injection.

GENERAL MOTORS - GM introduces for 1987 the two-seat luxury car, the Cadillac Allante, with a rumored price of about \$50,000.

In a most unusual arrangement, GM will ship parts from Detroit and Europe to the factories of Italian coachbuilder Pininfarina. Car bodies made there will be flown by cargo jet to GM's new Detroit-Hamtramck assembly plant for finishing, including installation of a 4.1-liter V-8-powered front-wheel drive system.

GM this year will fill a major gap in its lineup — compact cars for its Chevrolet division.

Chevy, the industry's largest division, has been without a compact car since the Citation, one of the problem-plagued X-cars, was discontinued 18 months ago.

When GM's compact N-cars came out in 1984, Pontiac got the Grand Am, Buick got the Somerset and Oldsmobile got the Calais.

But Chevrolet dealers had no X-car replacement — until this model year when the two-door Beretta and four-door Corsica debut.

The cars, while having some rounded




